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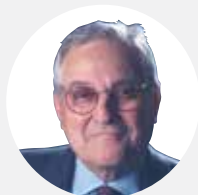

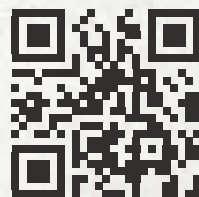

Every case was bought as a future back in the day from reputable sources and has been stored perfectly ever since acquisition; as such, these cases are all in excellent condition, so bid with the utmost confidence here.

BORDEAUX

CHÂTEAU HAUT-BRION

Haut-Brion has the longest history of all the First Growths. It was even mentioned by Samuel Pepys in his diary entry of April 10, 1663, when he was dining at the Royal Oak Tavern in Lombard Street, London: "...and here drank a sort of French wine called Ho Bryan that hath a good and most particular taste I never met with."

The famous Pontac family set up the estate in the first portion of the sixteenth century. Wealthy and well connected, they had the means to promote the wine in fashionable places, and by the early 1700s it was as well known as a wine of the highest quality.

While parts were split off, the estate stayed with the family until it was passed to Joseph Fumel in 1780. He was largely responsible for creating much of what we see today, including the buildings, the gardens and the general layout of the property. He famously hosted a visit from Thomas Jefferson on May 25, 1787, and became Mayor of Bordeaux three years later.

With its popularity waning under a succession of different owners, the estate was finally put up for auction in 1836, where it was purchased by the Larreau family. Two years later, in 1838, they managed to acquire a further piece of the estate previously lost through inheritance laws.

Although it was included as a First Growth in the 1855 classification of Bordeaux, difficult times lay ahead. A further succession of owners and the depression of the early 1930s forced another sale. This time, successful American financier Clarence Dillon stepped up, and for a little under \$200,000 walked away with the estate. It remains in the Dillon family today.

Vineyards, Winemaking and the Delmas Family

No discussion of the wines of Haut-Brion can be complete without a mention of the Delmas family, who have managed the property since 1923—first George Delmas, then his son Jean-Bernard, and today Jean-Philippe. It is not only unusual but also massively fortunate for Haut-Brion to have the care and attention of such a talented family of technical directors.

Jean-Philippe Delmas is a clever, tirelessly devoted man, and the solid support and financial backing of the Dillon family has enabled him and his team to produce an extremely consistent wine. I always look forward to visiting Château Haut-Brion, not just because the wines are superb and the people great, but also because it is unique and has an important place in the history of Bordeaux.

CHÂTEAU LAFITE ROTHSCHILD

For as long as anyone can remember, Lafite has been the most highly regarded wine in Bordeaux. From their very first book, published in 1845, Cocks & Feret have listed Lafite first, and it was ranked first in the famous 1855 classification of Bordeaux.

Fite is an old French term meaning small hill, rise or mound; it is from this humble feature in Bordeaux' somewhat bland landscape that France's most esteemed producer takes its name. The Château itself is one of the oldest in Bordeaux, with much of it dating from the mid-sixteenth century. It was purchased by the wealthy Ségur family in the seventeenth century, but like much of the region at the time, the land was used for a variety of farming.

Beginning in the 1670s, the Ségurs spent around twenty years converting a large portion of the land to vineyards. With Latour and Calon, as well as Lafite, under their ownership, the Ségurs began to find a market for their wines in London. It was first mentioned in the London Gazette in 1707 and soon became famous: by the early 1730s, it was a favorite of the Prime Minister, Robert Walpole.

Lafite remained in the Ségur family until 1784. It was sold several times, finally to Baron de Rothschild in 1868, by which time there were some seventy-four hectares of vines. It was a new era of industrial wealth and the Rothschild purchase certainly added much celebrity to the area.

CHÂTEAU LATOUR

Some of my fondest wine memories are of drinking wine bottles of the renowned Château Latour. It is, without a doubt, one of the greatest wine estates in the world. While its history goes well back to the fourteenth century, Latour began to be clearly defined as one of the greatest wine estates in the world in the mid-nineteenth century, and amazingly, It has kept that position for the last 150 years. Their wines, which are known for their power, richness and longevity, are sought after by collectors and wine lovers throughout the world.

As Robert M. Parker says of Château Latour in The World's Greatest Wine Estates, "The wine produced here has been an impeccable model of consistent excellence, in great, mediocre, and poor vintages. For that reason, many have long considered Latour to be the Médoc's finest wine... Latour remains one of the most concentrated, rich, tannic, and full-bodied wines in the world."

In 2000, I had the wonderful opportunity to taste over twenty-five vintages of Château Latour, including fourteen wines older than 1961 and four from the nineteenth

century. It was an evening I will never forget. The wines were so rich, alive and fresh. What an extraordinary experience it was to be able to taste the 1900 and the 1899 side by side and discuss the differences, or to argue whether the 1955 or the 1949 is showing better right now (at my table we all thought the 1955 had the slight edge). In the end we tasted Latour from a 125 year span and although there was a lot of discussion about which were the better wines, the final conclusion of everyone in the room was that, "Latour makes some of the greatest wines that any of us have ever tasted."

CHÂTEAU MARGAUX

Perhaps the grandest of the Bordeaux châteaux, Château Margaux is the epitome of style and refinement. At Château Margaux one has truly arrived at the heart and soul of Bordeaux, the world's most renowned wine region.

For centuries before the French Revolution, the château was owned by the Lestonnac family. The revolution, though, saw the estate's owners beheaded, and when the heirs were unable to pay the costs of running the château, Margaux was put up for auction.

The successful bidder, the Marquis de la Colonilla, demolished the old château, and in 1802 work began on the grand château we know today. The Château was sold several times until it was acquired by the Ginestets, longtime shareholders who finally became sole owners in 1949, with the purchase financed by the sale of their St Emilion property, Clos Fortet. However, First Growth châteaux are expensive to run, and to finance the operations of the estate, the owner sold off the vineyards of Dufort Vivens in the 1960s and transferred Château Cos d'Estournel to his sister in 1971. Even those moves, though, were not enough, and collapse of the Bordeaux market in the early 1970s forced Ginestet to sell the château in 1976 to Greek supermarket magnate Andre Mentzelopoulos. A serious oenophile, he was also a major shareholder in the French wine firm, Nicolas.

CHÂTEAU MOUTON ROTHSCHILD

Mouton, like much of Pauillac in the sixteenth century, was part of the sprawling Ségur estate. In the mid-eighteenth century the land that is now Mouton Rothschild was acquired by Baron de Brane, who changed the name to Brane-Mouton. Brane sold it in 1830 to an M Thuret; while it was already a notable Château, first appearing in a Christie's catalog in 1834, Thuret did not make maintenance of the Château a priority and resold it in 1853. The purchaser was Baron Nathaniel de Rothschild, at the time head of the English arm of the wealthy Rothschild family.

While Mouton was always a highly regarded wine, a big change came when in 1922, when the twenty-one-year-old Baron Philippe decided to run the Château full-time. An innovator from the start of his tenure, in 1924 he decided that in order to guarantee quality the entire production would be bottled at the Château, and from 1934 he numbered each bottle released. Also, of course, he started the tradition of works of art on Mouton labels, featuring the famous Carlu ram's head from 1924 to 1926, and since a hiatus from then until 1945, each label has either been designed by a major artist or featured a tribute to a significant event in the Château's history.

Perhaps his most significant achievement was persuading the French Minister for Agriculture, Jacques Chirac, that Mouton was and had always been a First Growth that had been wrongly classified. So, in 1973, for the first and only time, a revised edition of the 1855 classification was released with Mouton finally ranked, next to its Pauillac neighbors Lafite and Latour, as a First Growth.

PETRUS

Petrus today is a little over eleven hectares, including five hectares purchased in 1969 from neighboring Château Gazin. The vineyards have clay topsoil and gravelly subsoil, allowing good initial water retention but excellent longer term drainage. The vines are old, around forty to fifty years, planted with ninety percent Merlot and

five percent Cabernet Franc. To increase concentration the vines are pruned extensively and a green harvest is performed. At harvest time, nearly two hundred workers pick the grapes at their peak of balance and ripeness. Sometimes up to four passes are needed but if pressed, as in 1982, the entire harvest can be completed in just one day.

The grapes are partially destemmed and after a fairly lengthy maceration period, sometimes almost a month, the wine spends twenty months in new oak before being fined (but not filtered) and bottled. Petrus is a classic example of careful vineyard management and winemaking yet the result leaves evidence of something even greater. These methods combine with exquisite terroir for Merlot to create something that is, in good vintages, not only earth-shatteringly tasty, but distinctive, lending the name Petrus majesty because of its quality but also its inimitability.

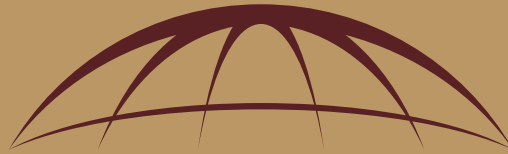

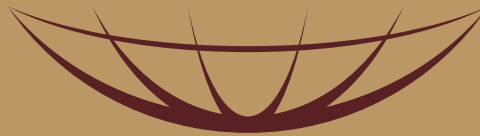

GAJA

In the mid-nineteenth century the Gaja family began producing wine in Piedmont. Giovanni Gaja established the winery and Angelo, the fourth generation, joined the family firm in 1961. Angelo Gaja, born in 1940 and the present director of the family firm, has a degree in enology from Alba as well as a masters in economics. In 1974 he went to California, where he presumably fell under the spell of the barrique. Gaja has achieved unequivocal success aging his Barbarescos in small, new oak barrels, where the wine takes on a certain subtlety and suppleness without losing the personality of the Nebbiolo grape.

Gaja is the largest private owner of vineyards in the Barbaresco zone, with 153 acres of vines in Barbaresco, Treiso, and Alba. They own fourteen different vineyards in Barbaresco and Treiso that make up their Barbaresco normale. Besides this regular Barbaresco, Gaja bottles three individual crus. Of the three, Costa Russi matures the soonest. It is the most open, with a sweeter taste and more intense aroma. Sori Tildin is more closed and concentrated; it is firm in texture and holds more in reserve. Sori San Lorenzo is the hardest of all in its youth, requiring age to show its real quality. It is the slowest maturing of the crus as well as the longest lived.

RIDGE MONTE BELLO

The beginnings of this classic estate date back to 1885 when San Francisco Doctor Osea Perrone bought 180 acres on Monte Bello Ridge in what is now the Santa Cruz Mountains AVA. Vineyards were planted in 1886 and the first wine under the Monte Bello label was produced in 1892 from the upper terrace of vineyards. William Short owned the middle terrace of vineyards on the ridge and sold them in 1959 to three scientists from Stanford University. In 1962 the new owners formed a partnership that became Ridge Vineyards, re-bonding the winery so they could again produce wine for commercial sale. In 1966 Ridge purchased the old Monte Bello winery and a small part of the Perrone vineyard property, and Ridge Monte Bello was born. This wine is made from over thirty parcels from the Monte Bello Vineyard vinified separately. The assemblage is made through a blind tasting selection of each parcel over a number of months, primarily Cabernet Sauvignon with a touch of Merlot and, in some vintages, Petit Verdot. The philosophy is for the wines to be born as naturally as possible, with wild yeasts from the vineyard. The wines are rich and ripe and age gracefully. Paul Draper, CEO of Ridge, has been the winemaker for over forty years. A legacy in his own right, Paul has been named "Man of the Year" by Decanter magazine, received the "Distinguished Service Award" from Wine Spectator magazine, was the first recipient of the "COPIA Award" for winemaking, was named Personnalité de L'Année by Les Grand Prix Du Vin in Paris and was given the James Beard Award for winemaking.

CHÂTEAU CHEVAL BLANC

Cheval Blanc has a relatively short history compared with the other top-rank châteaux of Bordeaux. As recently as the 1830s it was still a part of Figeac. A portion of that estate was sold to the Ducasse family, then owners of L'Évangile, and by twenty years later, when a Ducasse married a Fourcard-Loussac, the property was already some thirty-one hectares in size. The estate remained with the Fourcard-Loussac family until part of it was sold to Bernard Arnault and his company, LVMH, in 1998. Today, along with Château d'Yquem, it is fully owned by Arnault and managed by the dynamic Pierre Lurton.

Cheval Blanc, across the road from Pomerol, has distinctive soil makeup: about twenty percent sand, forty percent clay and forty percent gravel. In the gravelly and sandy areas the roots have to work hard to stay alive and often reach depths of seven to eight meters, compared with two to three meters in the clay areas.

Today the roughly thirty-seven hectares of vineyards are planted with sixty percent Cabernet Franc and forty percent Merlot. Yields are typically thirty-five hl/ha, and the annual production of 6500 to 7000 cases is bottled after eighteen to twenty-four months in new oak.

CHÂTEAU CHÂTEAU COS D'ESTOURNEL

Château Château Cos d'Estournel is regarded by many as the finest wine within the northern commune of Saint Estèphe and is certainly an aesthete's delight. Driving past the stately Château Lafite Rothschild with its manicured gardens and willow-trees billowing in the wind, you enter a rollercoaster dip which ascends towards a building that appears to have been designed on LSD with its Chinese pagodas and menagerie of creatures: lions, elephants and unicorns sculpted in sandstone that radiates at sunset. Even the large main door is ornately carved with exotic flora and fauna. What is surprising is that this is not even a place of residence: but simply one of the most outrageously decadent chais in the world.

The history of Château Château Cos d'Estournel is one of the most colourful in Bordeaux and is associated with iconic figures of the nineteenth century.

The word "Cos" derives from Gasconne tongue, meaning "hill of pebbles" whilst its appendage is down to Louis-Gaspard d'Estournel who was born in 1753 and lived to the ripe old age of ninety-one, passing away just two years before his beloved estate was classified as a Second Growth, along with Château Montrose. Louis Gaspard had a penchant for acquiring land, inheriting his first parcel at the tender age of twenty-nine and having acquired a parcel of vines near the village of Cos, he recognized that the terroir was similar to that of Lafite and immediately resolved to create a wine of equal stature. Between 1821 and 1857 he expanded the vineyard piecemeal from twelve to fifty-seven hectares including the best parcel of vines from the neighbouring Château Cos Labory, eventually owning the whole hill.

CHATEAU LA CONSEILLANTE

One of the most elegant labels among all the top growths in the Gironde area is that produced by Château La Conseillante in Pomerol. The label is white with a fancy silver shield and a broad silver border. The capsule is a rich blue-purple which will stand out in every bin. Moreover, what is in the bottle is, after Petrus, one of the best wines in the commune.

The female councilor in the title, La Conseillante, was Catherin Conseillan, a dame de fer, a lady who had a business dealing in metals in Libourne in the middle third of the eighteenth century...Perhaps it was because she wholesaled ploughshares and wire on which vines could be trained that this lady had the idea of developing a section of land on the Pomerol-St Emilion border between 1735 and 1776. She was certainly one of the pioneers of vineyard exploitation in the area. In 1756 a wine called La Conseillante was baptized. It has been one of the leading Pomerol crus ever since.

La Conseillante lies at the extreme eastern end of Pomerol just by the crossroads where one turns off the D21 to go down to Cheval Blanc, and is bounded by Petit Village, Vieux Château Certan, Petrus and L'Evangile on the Pomerol side and by Cheval Blanc itself across the road and the commune boundary. Part of the vineyard, indeed, is in St Emilion. The vineyard is in one piece and has remained the same size, roughly twelve hectares, since the Nicolas purchase. It now produces forty to forty-five tonnes from equal proportions of Merlot and Cabernet Franc and ten percent Malbec.

The land here is some thirty-five metres above sea level, a plateau of gravel, clay and sand, which rises marginally to the north towards Petrus and descends in the opposite direction towards the Dordogne and the outskirts of Libourne.

The winemaking...has remained traditional. The wine undergoes a long maceration with the skins, is matured in oak barrels, half of which are renewed each year, and kept twenty to twenty-four months before bottling. It is neither filtered nor, even when it undergoes periodic racking, never pumped. Movement from one receptacle to another is by gravity...The wine resembles Lafleur Petrus rather than Lafleur or Petrus itself in that it is elegant rather than densely structured, perfumed and accessible rather than firm and unforthcoming, delicately rich and refined rather than voluptuously solid. This, I would suggest, is a result of the gravel and sand elements in the soil. What I find exciting about a good Conseillante is its complexity, the depth and concentration of its fruit; above all, its breed. Though it seems to mature faster than some of its more muscular neighbours, the wine is normally impeccably balanced and therefore will certainly keep. As the Conseillante motto has it: 'Faire peu mais fair bon' ('Make little, but make it good'). It deserves its high reputation.

Although the histories of Château Haut-Brion and La Mission are entwined, both have always been separate entities, sharing a common family name. It is only since 1983 that they have shared the same proprietor when it was taken over by the owners of Haut-Brion...

On November 2nd 1983, the present owners acquired La Mission after the owner Francis Dewavrin was unable to resolved internal family disputes over the way the property was managed and it marks a convergence of histories between Château Haut-Brion and La Mission, though only in the sense that they share the same owner: Clarence Dillon. He enlisted Jean-Bernard Delmas as Château-manager and there followed a period that has consolidated La Mission's position as one of the greatest estates, hovering just outside the First Growths.

Their commitment to innovation and improvements has been a catalyst for many estates in the Graves region to improve their wines, particularly with respect of clonal selection research. In 1987 the old chai was renovated, a new state-of-the-art cuvier was installed and a new bottling line was implemented in 1996. It must be emphasized that the estates are treated as separate entities, even though at some point the vines of both run side-by-side. In 2003 Jean-Bernard retired and handed the reins over to his son, Jean-Philippe Delmas.

Certainly since the arrival of Jean-Bernard Delmas the style of wine has improved: the wine is more pure and the volatile acidity has been eradicated. At its best (the 1966, 1975, 1998) La Mission is a massive, tannic behemoth that has more in common with Château Latour than Château Haut-Brion. It is a powerful, sturdy wine with firm tannins and admirable longevity...

This is definitely one of the most intriguing wines in Bordeaux: the appeal of La Mission is that it seems to avoid the vagaries of wine-making trends and wears its heart on its sleeve. This is a classic wine in every sense of the word and it can make a seamless match with food. A poor La Mission is still a better wine than most; a good La Mission is a great wine and a great La Mission can be a religious experience. I have met few wine-critics who do not hold this estate in high esteem: it is a wine for true wine-lovers.

CHÂTEAU L'ÉGLISE CLINET

Château L'Église Clinet has a long history. It dates all the way back to the back to the late 1800s. Clos L'Église-Clinet was created in 1882. This happened when two families agreed to join together and form a partnership to produce Bordeaux wine together. The families were Mauleon Rouchut of Clos L'Église. And the Constant family, the owners of Château Clinet. From that point forward, until the mid-1950s, their Bordeaux wine was sold under the name Clos L'Église-Clinet.

After that date, the wines were released just as they are today, under the current name of, Château L'Église Clinet. Before Denis Durantou, the current owner and wine maker took over, his great-grandfather managed the property. The elder Durantou spent all his time as a shopkeeper. He did not live at the chateau. He preferred to spend his time on his dairy farm, located in Coutras.

Denis Durantou took over the winery in the mid-1980s. The property, slowly but surely keeps getting better and better. Today, it is one of the stars of Pomerol! The wine is concentrated, full-bodied, opulent and rich. Everything is in harmony. This special Bordeaux wine offers a purity of fruit, exotic spice components and freshness. The portion of old vine Cabernet Franc, which is close to 70 years of age is part of what makes this wine unique. Those vines are a large component of what separates the style and aromatic complexity of L'Église Clinet from the most of the other top Pomerol wines.

CHATEAU LÉOVILLE LAS CASES

The château gets its name from the Marquis de Las-Cases Beauvoise who, upon the dividing up of the vast Léoville estate, ended with the largest portion. Hugh Barton bought a quarter, Baron Poyferré (a relative) ended up with another quarter, and the remaining half went to the Marquis.

As debt accumulated during the earlier part of the twentieth century, the estate was gradually acquired by its then manager, Theophile Skavinski. Jean-Hubert Delon, the estate's present owner, is one of his descendants.

Although there are nearly 100 hectares under vine here, it is the fifty-three hectares of Grand Clos with that famous wall and arched entrance that is the primary source of fruit for the grand vin. The vines are planted to seventy percent Cabernet Sauvignon, seventeen percent Merlot and thirteen percent Cabernet Franc. Ageing is in sixty-five percent new oak barriques for fifteen to eighteen months, which just goes to show you don't need three and a half years in 100 percent new oak to make great wine. The second wine, Clos du Marquis, was one of Bordeaux' first when the 1902 vintage debuted.

These are serious wines, as good as any in the Médoc and in many years outperforming its second growth status. This estate could be called "the Latour of St Julien," which is actually not very far from the truth as it does reside right next door to the First Growth!

VIEUX CHÂTEAU CERTAN

Originally known as Sertan, the chateau was owned by the Demay family from the 1750s until the mid-nineteenth century when a portion of was sold to Charles de Bousquet (another portion is now Certan de May). Cocks & Feret listed VCC first among Pomerol vineyards in their publication of 1868. It remained with de Bousquet until its sale to Georges Thienpont in 1924, a member of a family of successful Belgian merchants who still own VCC, as well as its neighbor Le Pin.

The vineyards have gravel topsoil with an iron-rich clay subsoil, perfect for the Merlot and Cabernet Franc which dominate the blend. A little larger than Petrus, the vineyards cover 13.5 hectares producing roughly 5000 cases annually. The grapes, sixty percent Merlot, thirty percent Cabernet Franc and ten percent Cabernet Sauvignon, are totally destemmed prior to fermentation in tank. Following this they then go into 100 percent new oak barriques for eighteen to twenty-two months before fining with egg whites and bottling.

CHÂTEAU D'YQUEM

Château d'Yquem is the apex qualitatively and the centre geographically of the Sauternes area. Each major property occupies its own little hill. Yquem's is the highest. It is also the largest estate, the most perfectionistic, the most consistent. Unlike the rest of the region there was no cutting of corners, no lack of investment, no dip in quality in the sad days of the 1960s and 1970s.

At Yquem we have Sauternes winemaking at its most perfectionistic. The vines are pruned to yield nine hl/ha – one glass per vine (as opposed to a full bottle in a classified growth red wine château). Collection of the grapes is berry by botrytised berry, rather than by bunch or half-bunch elsewhere. The grapes are crushed in a small horizontal hydraulic press in three stages. Unlike in Champagne, for example, the first pressing does not necessarily give the best wine. There is no débourage before the wine is put into cask. Fermentation and ageing is in new oak, of course, the latter taking place in a splendid underground cellar, constructed in 1987. The assemblage is late and the wine is not bottled for three years or more. Only then is it put on the market...

There is something very special, and indeed very consistent, about Yquem. The wine is more oaky than most in its youth. It is by quite some way the richest, most concentrated, most intense wine of its kind. In great years – I have a marginal preference for 1989 over 1990 and 1988 – it is nectar: the liquid quintessence of concentrated sunbeams, to quote Thomas Love Peacock.

HENRI BOILLOT

The Boillot family is one of the most well established dynasties in Burgundy, with five generations producing wine since 1855. Henri Boillot himself, dissatisfied with the light-bodied wines produced at the family domaine, left in 1984 to found his own negociant line of wines made in a more structured, intense style. The wines found great critical and commercial success and he was welcomed back into the family domaine, eventually buying out the shares of his brothers and sisters in 2005 and changing the name from Domaine Jean Boillot to Domaine Henri Boillot to mark the purchase and avoid confusion with his brother's Domaine Jean-Marc Boillot. A range of negociant wines is also produced under the name Maison Henri Boillot.

Domaine Henri Boillot wines are produced from fourteen hectares in the Côte de Beaune, half red and half white, with a philosophy of low yields, late harvesting by hand and two passes on a sorting table to ensure that only the best berries are selected. Maison Henri Boillot wines are produced with the same philosophy, with vinification of the negociant wines in Volnay and the domaine wines in Meursault. Today Henri Boillot continues to run all aspects of both operations, both in the vineyard and in the cellar, and with his son Guillaume working with him has assured that this historic name will continue to be among the best of Burgundy.

CLOS DES PAPES

Paul Avril (1873-1962) was one of the people behind the creation of the appellation. In 1896 he started to sell his wines with the name Clos des Papes. Régis Avril (1901- 1987) delivered wines to two presidents of France General de Gaulle and Georges Pompidou. Paul Avril (1937-2009) started working at the domain 1963 at first together with his father and later for many years with his son. Paul-Vincent Avril (1965 -) attended as a young man wine school in Burgundy and when he went back to the domain in 1988 he had visions about finesse and elegance and he still considers these qualities as most important for a high class wine. One parcel is nearby the pope's castle and has been surrounded by walls (clos). From here came the name of the domain. Since 2011 the vineyards are certified "agriculture biologique"

Only one cuvée of white (ten percent of the production) and of red Châteauneuf-du-Pape are made. Since 1991 destalking has been total and since 1987 the total production has been bottled at the domain. The secret behind the high quality is a low yield. The yield is minimized by green harvest and by repeated sorting of the grapes during harvest. Clos des Papes is not a place for experiments.

JABOULET

When one thinks of Hermitage, one thinks of Paul Jaboulet Aine's cuvee, La Chapelle, one of the world's greatest wines. La Chapelle takes its name from the Saint Christophe Chapel that sits on a steep part of the Hermitage hill. While the firm was founded in 1834 by Antoine Jaboulet, it was quite some time before the famous La Chapelle name was to appear on the label. It is hard to find definitive information as to the first vintage of La Chapelle, but the Jaboulets have been sole owners of the land it comes from since 1919.

The soils are still plowed mainly by horse or mule, with the vines trained to stakes or bush-trained goblet. The average vine age is thirty-five to forty years, with some reaching seventy years before being pulled up. Picking is done mainly by hand, parcel by parcel as each becomes fully ripe. Today there is complete de-stemming and a three-to four-week maceration prior to fermentation. The wine is then racked off into oak barrels, one-third of which are new, where it spends anywhere from twelve to eighteen months maturing before bottling without filtration.

VALDICAVA

The tiny twenty hectare Valdicava estate was born in 1953 when Bramate Abbruzzese was offered the opportunity to return to his ancestors' property in Montalcino. It still accounts for only 1.5% of the Brunello vineyards in Montalcino and a mere one percent of production, producing only 5000 cases of wine even in a strong year. However, the cult status surrounding this wine is growing and Robert M. Parker asserts, "a strong argument can be made that Valdicava is among the top three or four Brunello di Montalcino producers." The Wine Spectator gave the 2001 Brunello and Madonna Al Piano Riserva scores of 98 and 100 respectively. The current winemaker Vincenzo Abbruzzese aims to merge tradition with modern practices, maintaining the structure and aromas of traditional Brunello, and the elegance and harmony associated with newer methods.

DOMAINE LEROY

Domaine Leroy boasts wines with the same energy and intensity as the woman behind them: Lalou Bize-Leroy. By 1955, when Lalou was still in her early 20s, she was running her family's historied negociant company, Maison Leroy. By 1974, she became co-director of Domaine de la Romanée-Conti, and, less than 20 years later, she was ousted by the board of DRC, in part for establishing such a successful competitor in Domaine Leroy (although she still has a quarter stake in DRC).

In 1988, finding it increasingly difficult to acquire wine from growers that met the exacting standards of Maison Leroy, Lalou purchased Domaine Charles Nöellat in Vosne-Romanée, renamed it Domaine Leroy, and proceeded to pioneer biodynamic viticulture at what would become one of most legendary domaines in Burgundy. Domaine Leroy has practiced biodynamic viticulture from day one – well before it became trendy – and has even stuck to its astrological guns through such hurdles as the mildew-riddled 1993 vintage. After all, according to Lalou, “wine is inspired from the cosmos, it tastes of the world itself.”

At Domaine Leroy, Lalou insists that “there is no winemaking and no winemaker,” just grapes that guide their stewards. To coax the utmost quality possible from her berries, Lalou never replants her vines, allowing them to mature; she eschews vine hedging (cutting back shoots after the flowering stage); and practices severe pruning and crop-thinning in the vineyard. Domaine Leroy's old vines, combined with unique vine training and strict pruning techniques, lead to ridiculously low yields and intensely concentrated flavor in the final product.

If you ask Lalou her secret to producing such iconic wines, she'll tell you “It is simple, I love my vines more deeply than most people.” Given the wines these vines produce, we don't blame her.

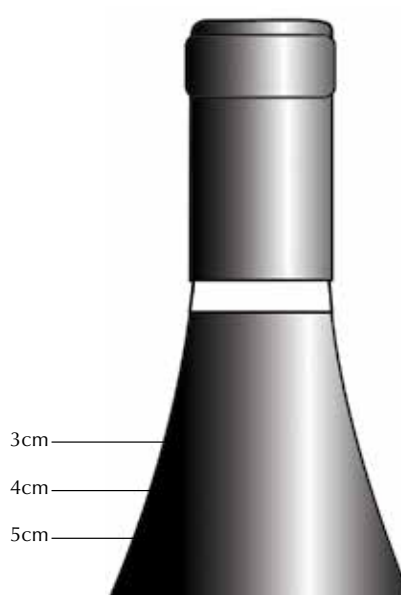

- BN **Bottom Neck:** Excellent for a wine of 10 years or older.
- VTS **Very Top Shoulder:** Normal for any wine 10 years or older.
- TS **Top Shoulder:** Normal for any wine 25 years or older.
- JBTS **Just Below Top Shoulder:** Normal for any wine 30 years or older.
- US **Upper Shoulder:** Slight natural reduction through easing of cork and evaporation through cork and capsule. Very good for any wine over 40 years old. Excellent for any wine over 50 years of age.
- UMS **Upper-Mid Shoulder:** Good for any wine 50-60 years of age.
- MS **Mid Shoulder:** Probably some weakening of the cork. Very good for wines over 50-60 years of age. Estimates usually take this into account.
- LS **Low Shoulder:** Some weakening of cork acceptable if wine or label is exceptionally rare or interesting.

Because of the slope of shoulder, it is impractical to describe levels of Burgundy-shaped bottles as into neck, etc. Wherever appropriate, the level between capsule and wine will be measured and cataloged in centimeters.

The condition and drinkability of Burgundy are less affected by ullage than its equivalent from Bordeaux. For example, a 5 to 7cm. ullage in a 50 year old Burgundy can be considered normal, indeed good for that age; and 3.5 to 4cm., excellent for that age.

Champagne bottle measurements are done from the bottom of the foil to the level of the wine.

Label & Capsule Conditions

Labels and capsules can become soiled, stained, or otherwise marked, especially with wines over 20 years of age. Unless otherwise noted, label conditions will be appropriate for age, but Buyers should note that normal staining, discoloration or other conditions may not be noted if such conditions are appropriate for the age of the label.
